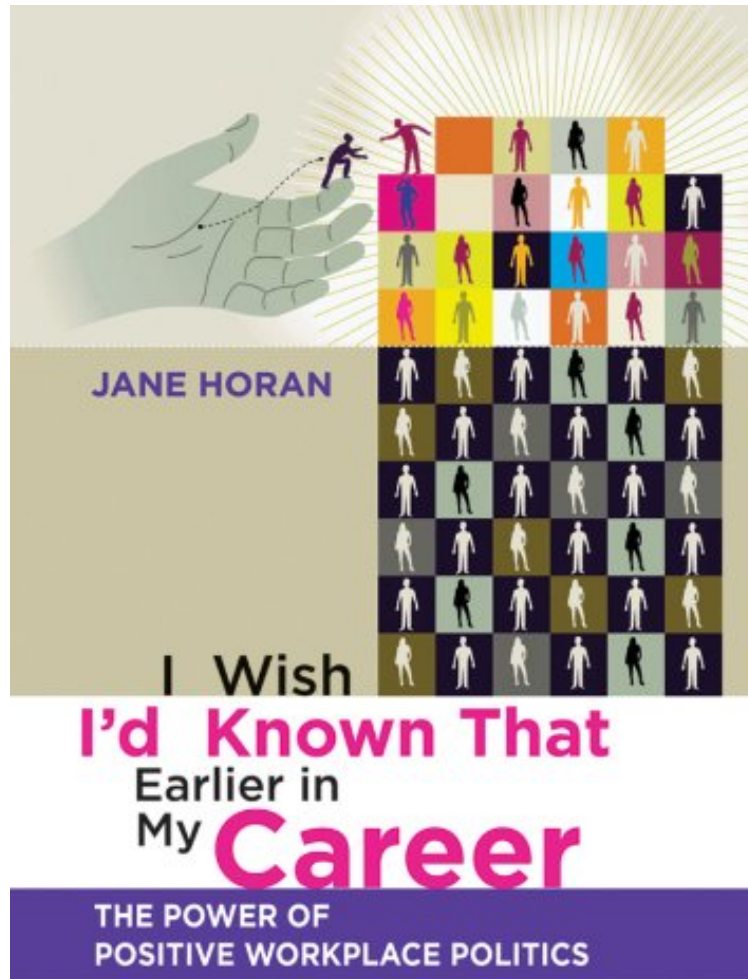

However I doubt this will do justice to this book... Every chapter is illustrated beautifully by stories/scenarios based on actual events. This one is a keeper for future reference. Lots of great tips.- For a given project, success is much more likely if you can get

stakeholder buy-in before you present to the key decision makers. Dealing with/explaining complex issues during a key presentation distracts from the main message, whereas gaining prior buy-in enables the attendees to focus on discussing innovative strategies to support the project- Know your "personal story", i.e. practice your 30-second elevator pitch that describes what you do at the company, in case you bump into the CEO on an elevator and s/he asks you what you do at the company- "Negative" politics aim to benefit the self (i.e. narcissist) whereas "positive" politics benefit the company- Page 50: Gaining insight into perceiving comments and discussion at face value vs. potential underlying meanings and messages.- Page 63: how to successfully transition into a new role relinquished by a "glorified" predecessor who was promoted (still with the company).- Pages 90-94: how to manage your reputation if there is a gap between self perception and how others perceive you- Communication tips (see pages 115-116 for details: prepare, ditch the tentative talk, goals and strategies provided on p.116 to enable you to contribute meaningfully to every meeting)There's much, much more, but I think it's really worth reading it.1 of 1 people found the following review helpful.
