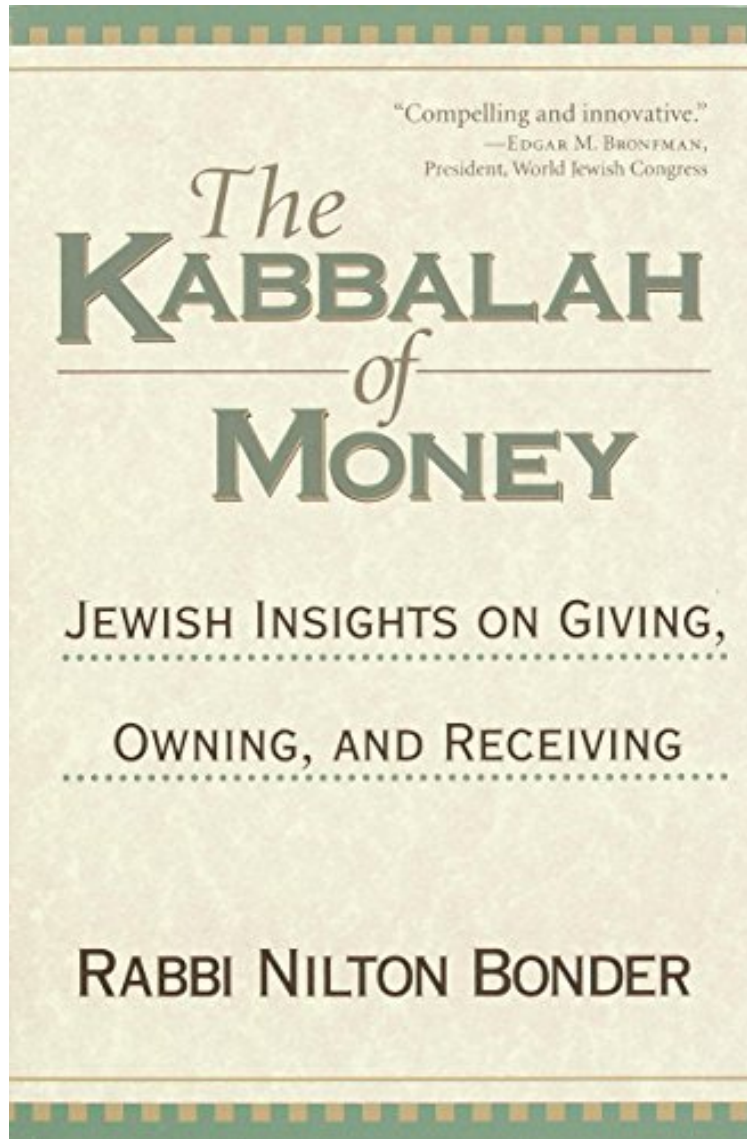

improving the quality of life ("tikkun haOlom") or desires insight into the inner workings of successful living. I've read and re-read this book multiple times since I bought it back in August, 2004. To say it is a business book "...Money" would indeed be a disservice to the reader and Rabbi Bonder. This book is about, first and foremost, understanding how one's behavior-- by thought, speech and action-- influences the environment for good or otherwise. Let me also point out that it does address business issues, but it does so with ample doses of Talmudic wisdom. And, to my pleasure, it is not overly heavyhanded in its scope. The book does not teach the how to's of getting into business, but the ethical and spiritual aspects. So, for instance, if one is a fan of Mr. Donald "The Art of the Deal" Trump, it would behoove you to have a copy of this while you're watching *The Apprentice*. It's akin to *The Power of Positive Thinking* and/or *Enthusiasm Makes the Difference* by Dr. Norman Vincent Peale, but with the obvious Jewish foundation.
